Chronos Music Society operates on Treaty 6 territory, a traditional meeting grounds, gathering place, and travelling route to the nêhiyaw/Cree, Dene, Anishinaabe/Saulteaux, Nakota Isga/Nakota Sioux and Niitsitapi/Blackfoot peoples. 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Chronos Voc

Since its founding in 2013, Chronos Vocal Ensemble has gained a national reputation for innovation and excellence. The ensemble has delighted audiences at concerts in Edmonton, on tours in four provinces, and at the conferences of Choir Alberta, Choral Canada and the American Choral Directors' Association. Chronos has been recognized both nationally and locally, with the Healey Willan Grand Prize in the National Competition for Canadian Amateur Choirs, and in Edmonton's Salute to Excellence.

Collaborators have included the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, Alberta Baroque Ensemble, Vocal Alchemy, Spiritus Chamber Choir (Calgary), Da Camera Singers and Edmonton Youth Choir. The choir's recordings are regularly featured on CBC's Choral Concert.

In championing new Canadian choral music, Chronos has given more than a dozen world premieres and commissioned composers including Andrew Balfour, Marie-Claire Saindon, Matthew Emery, Katerina Gimon, and Nicholas Ryan Kelly.

To bring more new works into the Canadian catalogue, the ensemble has offered an annual composition competition since 2017. The choir's fourth album, *Resolve*, features new music by eight Canadian composers.

Jordan Van Biert Conductor

Jordan unites singers in the common goal of creating rich musical experiences - for themselves, for each other, and for audiences. He founded Chronos Vocal Ensemble in 2013 to pursue excellence in choral performance. Early in his tenure with Chronos, Jordan was nominated as an Emerging Artist in Edmonton's Mayor's Celebration of the Arts. He also leads the choral organizations Vocal Alchemy and Ante Meridiem, and in 2016 received the Con Spirito award from Choir Alberta, for "spirit, dedication, and commitment to choral music in the Province of Alberta."

Jordan serves as a workshop leader, adjudicator, juror, and organizational consultant. As an educator he has worked with choirs at Concordia High School, Concordia University of Edmonton, and the University of Alberta. He appears regularly as an ensemble member and soloist with Calgary's Luminous Voices. Other interests include permaculture gardening, sustainable building practices, and the frustrating game of golf.

As we approach this exciting event, I'm very grateful for the music-making of the last ten years, and for the people who have made it happen.

Looking over our materials from the last decade in recent weeks has again given me ample opportunity to reflect on the valuable input given to Chronos since the start. From the builders, investors, caretakers, colleagues and collaborators; to the givers of advice and criticism, boosters, and problem-solvers, we would not be here today without their incredible gifts.

Tonight's program opens with sacred repertoire, mostly first performed by the choir in its first two seasons, followed by new Canadian repertoire explored in subsequent years. Each chosen work is significant in the choir's development, and several are represented on our recorded albums. We conclude the first half with *Only in Sleep*, featuring a heartfelt text about memory, which was the subject of a unique video project during the pandemic.

We began rehearsals on Stuart Beatch's *Chosen Family* in October 2023; Stuart has written us a gorgeous and meticulously crafted piece, and the process has been joyful. We have also been privileged to interact with poet John Barton during the final preparations for this performance, adding richness to the process. His poems selected by Stuart portray people and situations that are clearly so personal for *him*, yet are laden with relatability for us as readers. Stuart cares deeply about text, and his coupling of text and music here has achieved profound depths of emotion.

We conclude the concert joined by additional singers from our community, more than thirty in all, including folks who've sung with Chronos over the ten years we've been at it. We also feature both Jeremy Spurgeon and Kim Cousineau, whose hands at keyboards have also been a consistent and much-appreciated feature of this decade of music.

I'm deeply appreciative of all the singers who have given their voices, their artistry and their time to the music over this decade of singing, and it's been a delight to work with so many of them again in the past two weeks.

Jeremy Spurgeon organ

British-born Jeremy Spurgeon has won scholarships to study both piano accompaniment and organ at the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester and later studied organ with Lionel Rogg at the Geneva Conservatoire where he gained the Premier Prix de la Classe de Virtuosité.

In 1980 he came to Edmonton as director of music at All Saints' Cathedral and has since appeared in concert with many Canadian and international ensembles, singers and instrumentalists, including the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, Richard Eaton Singers, Pro Coro Canada, Edmonton Metropolitan Chorus, and Edmonton Opera. Jeremy has performed as piano accompanist and organist across Canada and Europe.

For four decades, Jeremy has devoted his talents to building and serving Edmonton's music community. A versatile performer and dedicated mentor to generations of young musicians, he is also an advocate for classical and church music in Edmonton.



Kim Cousineau piano

Kim Cousineau received a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Victoria, and studied privately with Anna Cal, student of Russian pianist Pavel Egorov. He is an alumnus of Opera Nuova's collaborative pianist program and has studied at the Franz Schubert Institute in Baden, Austria. Kim has worked as a répétiteur and music director for numerous organizations including Pacific Opera Victoria, Opera Nuova, Mercury Opera, Mayfield Dinner Theatre, MacEwan Theatre, and Concordia University of Edmonton. He is in high demand as a choral accompanist, collaborating with many groups including Chronos Vocal Ensemble, Vocal Alchemy, A Joyful Noise, Da Camera Singers, Concordia Concert Choir, and King's Cantorum and Chamber Choir. In addition to his work with choirs, Kim freelances as a vocal coach and studio pianist in the Edmonton area.



Stuart Beatch Composer-in-Residence

Stuart Beatch is a Canadian choral composer currently living in Edmonton. He received a Master of Music in Composition from King's College London, studying with composer Rob Keeley, and is the former composer-in-residence for The Fourth Choir (an LGBT chamber choir in London, UK). Beatch previously studied composition at the University of Alberta and has also received mentorship from Scottish composer Sir James MacMillan and Latvian composer Udis Praulins. While Beatch has a special affinity for the Canadian choral community, his music has frequently been sung by vocal ensembles across North America and Europe, including the BBC Singers, Voces Nordicae, Pro Coro Canada, National Youth Choir of Canada, Luminous Voices, musica intima, Chronos Vocal Ensemble, Spiritus Chamber Choir, Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, Cantabile Chamber Singers, Chorus Austin, and Choral Arts Initiative. He is an Associate Composer with the Canadian Music Centre and a member of the Canadian League of Composers.



John Barton Poet

John Barton is a poet, essayist, editor, and writing mentor. Among his twenty-eight books are twelve volumes of poetry, including West of Darkness: Emily Carr, a Self-Portrait, Hymn, For the Boy with the Eyes of the Virgin: Selected Poems, and Polari; a book of essays, We Are Not Avatars; and six critical books and anthologies, including Seminal: The Anthology of Canada's Gay-Male Poets and Best Canadian Poetry in English 2023. He is the recipient of three Archibald Lampman Awards, a CBC Literary Award, an eLit Award, and a National Magazine Award. His twelfth book of poetry, Lost Family, from which Stuart Beatch drew the four sonnets he set to music in "Chosen Family", was nominated for the Derek Walcott Prize in 2021. Born in Edmonton in 1957 and raised in Calgary, he lives in Victoria, B.C., where he was the city's fifth poet laureate from 2019 to 2022.


Only in Sleep

...until it's performed in real time." I had the pleasure of speaking with Stuart Beatch over a glass of Portuguese red during the first proper snowfall of the winter. Like the snow, we covered a lot of ground – an early crisis of conscience; tools, techniques, and harmonic language; commissions and collaborations; and what might lie ahead...

How did you get into composing?

I started dabbling in composition while I was in high school, mostly instrumental music. For years, I never had anything performed - it was just something I loved doing. A turning point came when I was in the last year of my education degree, when Dominic Gregorio started as Director of Choral Activities at the

University of Regina. It was his first position after finishing his doctorate; he was enthusiastic to start new things. One of the first things was a composition competition, which I won. That was the first performance of my first choral piece, about 11 years ago. He did another competition in the winter semester, which I also won, and gave me my second choral piece performed.

There are lots of projects I'd love to do. It just is about finding the time to do them, finding the people that want to make it happen.

I was not involved in the choral scene at all, I had sung maybe two years of my life - I'm a trumpet player by trade - that was the moment at which I realized that this was something that I enjoyed doing. I really liked working with text. I felt like the medium of choirs fit my music a whole lot better. I had a crisis of conscience when I was finishing my education degree of realizing, like, do I really want to do this? Is this what I want to do for my career? And no, it definitely wasn't.

Very few people can make a fulltime living doing just composition. Do you have a day job?

I do, yeah, working for an insurance company as a writer on their marketing team. I'm at my computer, and then I'm off at the end of the day and I don't think about it. It's so much easier for me to leave that space to create and to do the things that I love doing.

On your website, you've branded yourself as a Canadian choral composer. Do you have any concerns about being pigeonholed?

I've been focusing on choral music and vocal music, and now in recent years focusing a lot on queer-themed music as being the main kind of niche that I do. I'm not sure if [instrumental music]

is where I want to keep going because I love working with text so much. I've kind of branded myself as a queer composer, and that's now a lot of the themes in the music that I'm doing...

I think every artist has multitudes within them, that there are lots of ideas I have, and lots of things I can do, and lots of projects I'd love to do. It just is about finding the time to do them, finding the people that want to make it happen.

A favorite saying of Brahms was: "to be a good musician, you have to read a lot." That's always stuck with me, as being true. You read quite widely...

[leaves and re-enters the room] This is my stack of chapbooks of all the poetry and things that I want to do at some point, people I want to work with, projects I want to make happen, poems I want to set to music. Just a million ideas, and I keep finding new books that jump out at me. In the last couple of years, where I've been trying to go down this road and working with more queer poets, trying to explore more projects that I want to make happen, I've had a lot more joy in doing what I do and really enjoying the process of writing music, really digging into poetry.

Do you have a text that you would love to set someday?

[leafing through the stack] What's in here? A couple poems by John Barton for sure. His poetry is just gorgeous and sexy and fantastic. There's this book by Kevin Cantor, Please Come Off Book, a couple in here, especially one called "People You May Know", which deals with sexual assault that is just gut-wrenching, that I would love to set to music one day if I can find the emotional opportunity to do so.

One that I've wanted to set for a long time, by a poet called Chen Chen, is "i love you to the moon &". The poem is very silly and talks about living on the moon growing lots of moon veggies. It's just so fun and so joyful. I think that's really what I want to keep doing in my music: more joy and more of the music that I want to hear.

It's early 2024: do you make musical resolutions? Is that a thing?

It's not. I mean, it hasn't been a thing, but I suppose it could be a thing. Just to continue making music with the people that I want to make music with. I think especially writing queer music and working with queer artists, being able to do something not focused on the commercial aspect, but just focused on creating music that I want to hear with the people that I want to make it with, with poetry that I love.

Ten years ago this month, Chronos Vocal Ensemble gave its first full-length concert performance.

Following a recital in November 2013 featuring 24 singers presenting an hour-length program, *Chronos Vocal Ensemble In Concert* was presented on January 12, 2014, featuring the full 32-voice ensemble in performance at All Saints' Cathedral. Jeremy Spurgeon joined the choir at the organ, and the featured work was Rheinberger's Mass in E Flat (*Cantus Missae*) for Double Choir.

To fund that first full concert, a Kickstarter campaign garnered \$5835 from 56 backers. This proved to be more than a third of that season's total operating budget of \$14,481.
